GOVERNORS SALUTE TO THE 1962-63 TELEVISION SEASON IN NEW YORK

For 114 days this past season, the newspaper stands of our city were empty. The Board of Governors feels it appropriate to note that tele-

vision, through the allocation of additional time, expanded news coverage, by playing host to literally hundreds of newspaper reporters, columnists and critics, kept the television viewers in the metropolitan area abreast of local, national and international news and features and made certain that bylines were not bygones.

The Governors also noted with great interest, an expanding emphasis on live and special programs dealing with community problems and local political affairs. Of equal importance to the production of the programs was their placement in prime time even on network flagship stations.

This season, too, saw an increase in the amount of general live programming in the New York area by the local station organizations as well as by outside producers. The Governors are hopeful that the stations will pick up their option on this concept in the year to come.

This season, too, found programs of important discussions and series of classical music programs in the major viewing hours.

All in all, the Governors feel that this has been a season of progress, made memorable by a substantial growth in additional community service. We applaud those constructive efforts of the eight New York channels.
